The JAHC deeply regrets the pain that running this piece has caused and disavows all forms of cultural appropriation. In deference to experts more educated on these difficult topics, the artist, production team, and JAHC have made the decision to not run the piece in today's show.

The JAHC seeks to be a team of leaders in art, personal expression, and community development. Leading the way in conversations of diversity, equity, and inclusivity is a responsibility that we must own and embrace.
